1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sree Narayana College, Alathur, is an esteemed institution of higher education situated in the town of Alathur and affiliated with the University of Calicut. The college has been named after the legendary saint, social reformer, philosopher, and mystic poet Sree Narayana Guru, who is renowned for his principles of universal fraternity and love. The principles of Guru, who believed in strengthening the community through education, serve as a guiding light for our institution.

Our college is dedicated to upholding the values and principles of Sree Narayana Guru by striving for the welfare of all without discrimination based on caste, creed, or religion. Our main objective is to promote societal development by imparting quality education to our students.

Ever since our inception, Sree Narayana College has played a vital role in disseminating knowledge and providing higher education to our students. We offer nine undergraduate and four postgraduate programs, including B.Com, B.A Functional English, B.A Economics, B.Sc Chemistry, BSc Mathematics, B.Sc Environment and Water Management, B.Sc Microbiology , B.Sc Zoology , B.Sc Botany, M.Sc Mathematics, MA English and M.Com under the regular stream, and M.Sc Zoology under the self-financing stream.

The Sree Narayana Trusts, Kollam manages our college's administration. The trust has undertaken various construction and renovation projects in the past five years, such as a fully digitalized computer and language lab, gymnasium, smart classrooms, and a fully automated library, using its own funds and grants from Management and PTA .

Our college's commitment to excellence has been recognized through accreditation with a B grade and a grade point of 2.64 in the second cycle. The college has been working based on the suggestions of the NAAC Peer Team of the second cycle and incorporating feedback from various stakeholders.

5. Inadequate funding from governmental agencies to undertake research and academic activities such as projects, seminars, and workshops.
6. Rigidity of the affiliating system, and less scope for curriculum design
7. Frequent failure of the internet that often interrupted online classes during covid period

1. The college has scope for active alumni support. A formal placement cell such as the global alumni chapter can be established under the supervision of the Alumni Association.

2. More Add-on courses to increase employability and to utilize online education platforms to design and introduce MOOC courses.

towards community development with the support of NSS and NCC.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Sree Narayana College, Alathur, is affiliated to the University of Calicut and adheres to the curriculum and syllabus of the University. The college uses a Choice Based Credit/Elective system and offers 4 PG and 9 UG programmes. The college has a system that is centrally supervised to guarantee effective curriculum delivery. Each department annually creates a schedule of academic activities based on the academic calendar published by the University of Calicut. Staff council, IQAC, and the CUCBCSS monitoring committee keep an eye on the methodical and successful implementation of the curriculum.

Due to their participation in many academic bodies and involvement in the evaluation process, faculty members of our college play a significant role in the development of curricula and the assessment process at the university level. Along with state government initiatives like the Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP), Walk With Scholar (WWS), Scholar Support Programme (SSP), and Remedial Coaching, various departments also offer different Add-on courses which ensures crucial job skills through practical learning. Over the last five years, the college has offered 35 Add-on courses. Students have been benefited to the maximum through these courses. Students' learning is enhanced by seminars, workshops, field trips, internships, project work, etc. The current curriculum gives UG students the option to select an open course, ensuring academic flexibility. Additional assurances of the effectiveness of curriculum delivery are provided through an annual academic audit and feedback from the institution's numerous stakeholders.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research extension and innovative activities of the college is in a developing stage. During the last 5 years, the institution was not able to mobilize many research grants from governmental or non-governmental agencies. But the college is keen on developing an innovative ecosystem, as part of which it has registered itself under IIC and has undertaken various other innovative measures.

The college has conducted 41 programmes related to research methodology (which aims to develop the student's ability to apply appropriate research techniques for their project report), Intellectual Property Rights (which aims to create awareness about IPRs, especially patents and copy rights among students) and programmes related to entrepreneurship development.

Regarding research articles being published in National/International Conferences, There are more than 25 research articles from different disciplines, text books in Nuclear Physics and Astrophysics. Some of the conference proceedings are published as Journals like Journal of Tropical Insect Science, Journal of Pure and Applied Microbiology etc. More than 12 research articles are published in UGC Care listed as well as SCOPUS indexed journals.

SN College Alathur, undertake extension activities under the initiative of NSS, NCC, various clubs and other departments. They take care of various activities on campus as well as the neighbourhood community. NSS and NCC encourage students as well as the community to save our environment by conducting tree plantations, ground water recharging to nearby homes, campus cleaning, riverside cleaning, and providing awareness classes about the adverse effects of using plastics, cleanliness and hygiene.

NSS and gender forum discusses social issues like gender equality, women empowerment etc through seminars, and classes. During the 2017-18 academic year NSS UNIT built a home for one of our students under the scheme “Abhayam”.

Student exchange/ internships done in three major research institutes, IRTC, CBNR, KFRI strengthened experimental learning, developed research skills and sharing of academic knowledge with students. Over the last 5 years, 9 MoUs (7 functional) were signed with different institutions and industries providing skill-based training, workshops, certificate courses to our students. Collaboration and MoUs both offer academic advantages and provide suitable skills to compete in the real world.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Criterion 4: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1. Physical facilities

The campus spread over 21 acres of land, is proud to have all the physical facilities required for curricular and co-curricular activities. A public addressing system enables the Principal to communicate with students and staff in areas of the campus including lecture halls, laboratories, sports facilities, and seminar halls. The Principal’s room, administrative office, all staffrooms, physical education rooms, and laboratories are provided with computers with high-speed internet facilities. Our facilities include:

Academic facilities –

Consists of lecture halls, science laboratories, a language lab for the Department of English, separate computer labs for UG and PG students, computerized and completely automated central library, etc. Every department of the College is provided with computers and projectors for academic activities.

Other support facilities –

Include girls’ hostel, student support facilities, administrative facilities, energy generation/conservation facilities, water conservation facilities, waste disposal facilities, campus monitoring facilities, automobile parking facilities, prayer mandapam, washrooms, etc. electricity generate using two solar panels of 4 KW each, is supplied to the grid, owned by the Kerala State Electricity Board Limited. Administrative facilities like University examinations, are completely computerised.

More than 81 % of the total expenditure, excluding salary, is used for augmentation of the infrastructure during

the last five years

4.2. Library as a learning resource

The library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), Koha version 21.11.09.000. The College is registered under the NLIST programe and hence is entitled to access the e-resources (6000 + e-journals and 164000 + e-books).

The library is equipped with a total of 21488 books, and 20 printed journals apart from the online journals available on different platforms. 15 computers with internet facilities and a printer are provided in the library.

4.3. IT Infrastructure

The entire campus of the College is Wi-Fi enabled for the use of staff and students. Wi-Fi facilities are provided by BSNL with a speed of 200Mb/s and are made available in all departments, administrative office, library, auditorium, and seminar halls.

An educational management system “Necttos” is used for the automation of teacher-student-related administrative activities.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>Interdisciplinary learning is a holistic approach that links the disciplines by emphasizing relationships and connections. It is a different approach to curriculum development and one that moves away from the traditional, subject-centered approach. Interdisciplinary experiences provide an opportunity for a more relevant, less fragmented, and stimulating experience for students. The college offers two undergraduate programmes such as BA Functional English and BSc Environment and Water Management which are interdisciplinary in nature. The other departments too have collaborated together to conduct inter-departmental activities to boost harmonious relationships among the staff and</p>
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	students of various departments.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	As an affiliated college of the university of Calicut, this college follows Choice Based Credit Semester System (CBCSS) for undergraduate and post graduate courses. The duration of a UG Programme shall be 6 semesters distributed over a period of 3 academic years. The odd semesters (1, 3, 5) shall be from June to October and the even semesters (2, 4, 6) shall be from November to March.: The UG Programme shall include five types of courses, viz; Common Courses (Code A), Core courses (Code B), Complementary courses (Code C), Open Course (Code D) and Audit courses (Code E). Common Courses: In general, every UG student shall undergo 10 common courses (total 38 credits) chosen from a group of 14 common courses listed by the Calicut University, for completing the programme.
3. The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The college, being affiliated to University of Calicut, adheres to the syllabus, academic calendar and regulations prescribed by the University. The academic year commences with the Staff Council and IQAC's approval of the action plans drafted for curricular and co-curricular activities. With the assistance of UG monitoring committee, PG monitoring committee, the IQAC and College Council consistently monitors the quality of curriculum delivery through academic audits, and by regular interactions with all stakeholders (students, parents and alumni). At the beginning of the academic year, based on the institutional timetable, the HoD prepares department time table, allots the portions, workload, charges and discusses the action plan for the academic year with the faculties. The teaching plan, lesson plan and work diary of faculties are appraised by the HOD in regular departmental meetings to ensure systematic delivery of curriculum. To elevate the standard of teaching, faculties are encouraged to attend **refresher courses** and **faculty development programmes**. During the COVID period, the faculties extensively engaged on online platforms with students to mitigate the shock of sudden lockdown and shift to online classes. The faculties adopted synchronous and asynchronous mode of curriculum delivery with the aid of **Google classrooms, Google Meets, YouTube and WhatsApp**. **Online assignments, seminars, quizzes, and exams** were conducted systematically to review students' response to online classes.

The newly admitted students are provided orientation programme to ensure a smooth transition from school atmosphere to college education system. **Examinations** are conducted periodically to figure out the needs of each student. **Bridge courses** are conducted by departments for students facing academic difficulties to bring them on par with their peers. The college further organises value-added courses, certificate courses, and add-on courses for augmenting the abilities of the students. Students are taken on field trips, industrial visits and study tours to complement their classroom education. The timely distribution of the Institutional **Academic Calendar**, which is prepared in accordance with University of Calicut's Academic Calendar, aids the students in comprehending the framework for the academic year.

The **Internal Exam Cell** performs a major role in assessing the effective delivery of curriculum. Under the counsel of Internal Exam Cell, our college conducts **two internal examinations**, college-level and the department-level. As a precedent to University examination, each department holds a model exam to familiarize students the University examination pattern. Faculties assign assignments and seminars, and individual tutorials to monitor the progress of each student. The college follows a three-phase internal assessment system to warrant fairness. The evaluated answer scripts are returned to the students in timely fashion and the internal marks are displayed on the notice board for scrutiny. Any grievance from students regarding marks awarded or examinations conducted is resolved by the **Grievance Redressal Cell**. A draft of the internal marks after scrutiny is exhibited again before uploading the marks on the

University website. Subsequent to each examination conducted in the college, the teachers meet each student individually to impart their feedback and suggestions.

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

In addition to traditional classroom instructions, our Institution uses various ICT-enabled teaching and learning mechanisms.

- Students' attendance is tracked using the attendance program named **NECTTOS**. The attendance status is available to teachers, students, and parents at any time and from any location.
- Teachers employ interactive whiteboards, LCD projectors, audio-visual aids, and equipment such as **Smartphones and Laptops** for improving the learning experiences of their wards.
- **The majority of the teachers have established websites, blogs, Google Classrooms, What's app, telegram groups, and YouTube channels where they post lectures on various topics on their allocated syllabus.** Also, subject-related Google sites are recommended for students for further knowledge accumulation.
- **Shodhganga and INFLIBNET** also support the learning acquisition process of both students and teachers.
- Students are encouraged to **submit assignments and seminar papers via Google Classroom platforms** to empower their technological knowledge as well as transform the learning process

into a paperless system. This transition to a virtually paperless system is also a major step towards inculcating an eco-friendly attitude among the students.

- Classes were offered during the pandemic period via **Google Meet, WebEx, and Zoom platforms**. Virtual classrooms also enabled active student participation and student-teacher interaction, just like traditional classrooms do.
- Access to extra resources and information is made possible through a **fully automated library and computer lab with WIFI connectivity**.
- The institution has access to **N LIST**, which is available to all faculty members as well as students.
- Every department at our college has access to the Internet. All digital resources offered by the department and the computer lab are accessible to students also.
- Academic lectures downloaded from YouTube and other digital resources are made available for students in the e-learning system.
- Online tests via Google Forms, quizzes, etc. are conducted frequently and e- assignments are given through Google Classroom.
- All departments conduct webinars, workshops, and invited talks on the latest developments in the academic arena for the effective teaching-learning process.
- Multimedia facilities are available in the lecture room, computer lab, and mini-conference room. In the seminar room, **ICT resources are used to conduct invited speeches, workshops, and webinars**.
- **Movie screenings by film clubs** are conducted for students.
- During the pandemic era, **club activities, and commemoration of important days were done online**.
- Participation of students in the organization of the events is always ensured.
- **Every year our College releases a manuscript containing the creative works of students**.
- Every year **orientation programs and bridge courses** organized for first-year students at the beginning of the academic year.
- **Remedial coaching and tutorial systems** enhance students' learning abilities.

The evaluation processes in the college are brought to the notice through **Orientation Programmes conducted at the beginning of the academic year**. Different measures are taken at various levels to ensure **the frequency and transparency of internal assessment which is robust and effective**.

The internal evaluation is based on a predetermined transparent system involving **periodic written tests, assignments, seminars, and attendance. Internal Examinations** are carried out to ensure a complete understanding of each topic by the students. The question papers are prepared by teachers by giving careful consideration to the syllabus prescribed. Final marks, after verification by students, are displayed on notice boards of respective Departments. The students are allowed to **attend a retest** if they could not attend the scheduled test due to genuine reasons.

One assignment and seminar for each paper is submitted by the student in each semester and marks are awarded on the basis of their performance. To ensure transparency of the mechanism, the internal assessment mark lists should be signed by all students in the concerned class. If they have any complaint regarding the marks allotted **they can report to the concerned teacher or to the Grievance Redressal Cell**. Uploaded internal mark lists are also signed by the students and the same is kept in the department concerned for further reference. Internal assessment marks awarded to the students each semester are notified on the notice board as well as on the College website.

To ensure utmost transparency for external examination, **CCTVs are installed in various examination halls**. Students should ensure 75% attendance in each semester to attend the examinations. Relaxations are provided on medical grounds. Both internal and external Practical examinations and Viva Voce are conducted as per the syllabi. **Parent Teacher meetings provide** an open platform for the parents to express their suggestions and grievances regarding their ward. Consolidated internal mark sheets as well as the progress in semester examinations are communicated to the parents.

Grievance Redressal Cell:

The college has taken up effective measures to resolve the difficulties faced by the students related to examinations. **The three-tier Grievance Redressal System is implemented to ensure utmost transparency in internal external assessment at Department, College, and University levels**, as per the guidelines of the University of Calicut. Grievances related to the conduct of examination and evaluation are reported to the **Department Level Cell** which is chaired by HoD and two senior faculty members. Grievance redressal forms are available in all departments for registering complaints.

If the grievance is not resolved, the students can forward it to the higher levels **College Level Grievance Redressal Cell and the University Level Committee**. The details regarding the Grievance Redressal Cell at the college level are published in the college calendar and website. The grievances are handled as per university proceedings. Students who do not want to disclose their identity can utilize **the complaint boxes** to drop their complaints.

The academic learning efficacy of all the programs and courses solely depends on PO and CO. The University of Calicut has a Board of Studies for each program with academic experts from the respective stream as members. The Board has the responsibility to revise the syllabus periodically and define the sets of POs and COs accordingly. **The University of Calicut revised the syllabus in 2019 and has set forth program and course outcomes for all courses.** The POs and COs are carefully drafted for all the UG and PG Programs following discussions with all the experts and stakeholders. The college has implemented the outcomes finalized by the University with a spectacular view of the holistic mission and goals of each program.

The programs offered by the college cater to the multifaceted interests and talents of the student community and also at building the human resources inevitable for the society and nation. The program outcomes and course outcomes are meticulously designed in order to impart validated knowledge and skills which are crucial for students' competence and personality-based performance.

Orientation programs for first-year students are conducted by the institution as a whole and individually by each department at the beginning of the academic year. **The syllabus, POs and COs, the mechanism for evaluation of outcomes of both internal and external evaluation as prescribed by the university, and program objectives are communicated to the students.** The program and course outcomes are also displayed on the department notice board.

Department meetings are held at the beginning of an academic year to allocate subjects and discuss the outcomes. The faculty members are then responsible for further communicating it to the students and clearing their doubts regarding them. Tutors are responsible to ensure that each student has a fair idea about the syllabus, POs, PSOs, and COs. **Bridge courses are conducted at the beginning of a semester to mold the students to meet the requirements of a particular course.** Internal examinations are conducted and the results of students are discussed with parents in the open forum. Results of University Examinations are evaluated at departmental and institutional levels.

A datasheet is filled out by the students at the beginning of the academic year in their first semester and it is updated by the tutor as and when the semester-wise results are published. It is used as a **continuous evaluation record for each student for assessment.** Remedial classes and Scholar Support Programs

are arranged for slow learners. These programs induce the students and help to achieve the attainment of the outcomes set.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1

Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

Sree Narayana College Alathur, which is spread over two panchayaths—Alathur and Kavasseri—is a rural college catering to the educational needs of socially and economically backward students. Since its inception, the college has been at the forefront of taking initiatives in new and innovative activities, whether it be in the field of academics, areas of environmental conservation, or skill acquisition.

Butterfly Garden: In-situ Conservation

The zoology department of the college maintains a butterfly garden for the in-situ conservation of different varieties of butterflies. As the college is in Palakkad district, which is infamous for the heat in summer, the department takes special care to maintain the greenery there.

Cloth bag distribution:

The Biodiversity Club of the College, in association with the Zoology Department, distributed cloth bags among the people of Alathur and Kavasseri panchayaths. This event was part of an awareness programme on the need to avoid plastics to save our mother planet. The students themselves manufactured the bags at home, wrote quotes on them from the college, and distributed them themselves.

Energy conservation: solar panels, LED lights, biogas plants

Palakkad is a district that gets abundant sunlight throughout the year. In order to reap the benefits of this and as an initiative to reduce mounting electricity bills, the college has installed solar panels, solar lights, and LED bulbs. The college is also maintaining its own biogas plant.

Groundwater recharging

The NSS units of SN College, in collaboration with 'Dhisa', took the initiative to implement ground water recharging units in various schools in Alathur. For the same reason, a technical team from the Centre for Water Resources Development and Management (CWRDM), Calicut, under the guidance of Dr. Harikumar P. S., Head and Senior Principal Scientist, Water Quality Division, visited our college on December 21, 2018 and trained our volunteers.

Incubation Cell

The institution has registered itself with the Institutions Innovation Council during the years 2021–22. But before that, the college has been active in incubation-related activities. The chemistry department of the college has taken initiative in manufacturing soap and allied products. The Botany Department has taken the initiative to cultivate mushrooms and sell them among the college staff and students.

Weather Forecaster:

In coordination with NABARD, a weather forecaster has been set up at the college. It helps to understand the climatic conditions in this area. It is useful to the students as well as the community.

Biodiversity Park

Sree Narayana College, Alathur, which is situated in a serene environment in Palakkad district, has a 25-acre campus. The college has maintained a bio-diversity park that has different varieties of flora and fauna.

Wet land conservation:

As a part of developing environmental consciousness, the NSS volunteers were involved in cleaning the nearby Thennilapuram, Gayathri River, and other nearby water bodies.

Clothes and household necessities to tribes near Kollengode; books to the nearby school; onapudava to poor aged people of Kavasseri Panchayath; kitchen utensils to those who have lost everything due to the flood of 2018; mobile phones to poor students to attend online classes during COVID; food to the hungry, etc.

Social upliftment activities

The college understands that the holistic development of the students happens not only by sharing their resources but also by making them a part of the awareness activities undertaken by the college. Social upliftment is possible only by providing them awareness on various social issues like Dowry, gender discrimination, HIV/AIDS, waste disposal, plastic waste management, water and soil testing, monsoon diseases, groundwater recharge, cancer diagnosis, etc.

Coaching for Competitive Examinations

The college takes initiative in providing NET, SET, and JAM coaching to the students of the college as well as those from the neighbouring community. The campus, spread over 25 acres of land, is proud to have all the physical facilities required for curricular and co-curricular activities. A public addressing system enables the Principal to communicate with students and staff in areas of the campus including lecture halls, laboratories, sports facilities, and seminar halls. Our facilities include:

The entire campus of the College is Wi-Fi enabled for the use of staff and students. Wi-Fi facilities are provided by BSNL with a speed of 200Mb/s and are made available in all departments, administrative offices, library, auditorium, and seminar halls. This enables the students to access online resources for references in actual classroom situations. It is used for academic activities of teachers and students, administrative activities related to student admission, student examination, and administrative activities of the office. Separate computer labs with internet/printer/projector facilities are provided for UG and PG students. The network of 15 computers in the library enables students and faculties to download e-books, and e-journals and access various e-resources. Each of the undergraduate departments is provided with a minimum of two computers with internet facilities and printers while every postgraduate department is provided with a minimum of three computers. These are used for academic as well as administrative activities of the departments.

Most modern ten classroom projectors are provided to each department by management and thirty computer systems are provided to main computer lab for the well-being of students.

Various committees are formed for the planning, preparation and execution of academic and non-academic programmes. Each committee consists of the co Ordinator and its members. The Anti Ragging Cell, Anti Narcotic Cell, Grievances redressal cell, Women’s cell, the Internal Complains Committee are compulsory. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

SreeNarayana College, Alathur is a Government Aided College . Central Government and State Government provide various welfare schemes for government employees. All these are enjoyed by the teaching and Non- teaching staff of these college . This institution provides safe and secure atmosphere which ensures high degree of job satisfaction to all employees. The following are the welfare schemes provided for the benefit of employees.

STATUTORY WELFARE BENEFITS:

- Gain PF: All teaching and non teaching staff contribute monthly fixed amount to their PF account. They can earn fixed rate of interest provided by government of Kerala. The staff are allowed to avail refundable and non-refundable loans as per their requirements on interest free

basis.

- Group Personal Accident Insurance Scheme:

All teaching and non teaching staffs are insured against loss of life due to accidents and unforeseen situations that may harm life under this scheme.

- State life insurance and Group insurance scheme

This scheme provides insurance coverage to the insured at low cost and provides death benefits to nominees in case of loss of life of insured.

LEAVE BENEFITS (as per central and state government and university rules)

- 15 days casual leaves annually are provided to all permanent teaching and non – teaching staff and 20 half pay leave can be availed annually to all permanent staff after completing one year of service.
- Maternity leave of 180 days can avail to all female teaching and non teaching staff and Paternity leave of 10 days can available to all male teaching and non teaching staff.
- Duty leave of maximum 10 days to teaching staff for participating various Orientation , Refresher, Seminar, Workshops, FDP, etc. Duty leave is also given to non teaching staff also.

Other SupportingFacilities includes Ladies hostel, Staff Association, Canteen facilities, Health Club facilities, First aid Facilities, Drinking Water Facilities , Well Developed Computer Lab facilities, Parking Facilities to both Teaching and Non-Teaching staffs in this institution.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization**6.4.1**

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The institution has transparent and systematic financial management machinery and conducts strict external and internal audits. The College Council, headed by the Principal, takes initiative for assessing, planning, implementing and supervising the fund raising activities of the college. The committee evaluates the requirements of the departments and other forums for the allocation of funds. The Council, Purchase Committee, IQAC, PTA and Library Advisory Committee, formulate strategies for fund mobilisation and its optimal utilisation.

The institution conducts internal & external financial audits regularly.

THE EXTERNAL AUDIT

The external audit is done at various tiers. It is performed mainly in four ways.

1. Deputy Directorate of Collegiate Education, Thrissur, Government of Kerala

The Regional Deputy Director is authorized to audit the collected and received funds of the institution from the Government. The Utilization/Non-Utilization details of such amount, its registers/accounts and so forth are audited every year. They scrutinize and verify Cash Book, acquittance, e-Grantz Account, Caution Deposit and Fee receipt, PD register, Seminars & IQAC etc.

2. Directorate of Collegiate Education, Government of Kerala

The funds and grants in aids from the state Government are assessed. Utilization/Non-Utilization information of such amounts, its registers/accounts and so on are audited. These include an audit of Cashbooks, bill books, fee receipts, Concession fees, non-plan contingent bills, Plan contingent bill, stock register, bills of lab chemicals, library books, etc. Non- Plan expenditure, Study tours, scholarships, Challans and receipts, PD accounts, fund for Sports, Passbooks, student union funds, salary of guest lecturers and remuneration Registers, Annual stock register, Demand Collection Balance Statement, Service books, Stock verification.

3.Accountant General Audit

The audit of the Accountant General entails:

- PD accounts
- Stock registers
- Retention of cash balance
- Recovery of pay and allowances

1.Chartered Accountants for UGC Funds and other funds:

The Management/PTA/Alumni funds and other contributions are availed to meet the developmental needs and the maintenance of the institution. Financial Assistance by the Management include financing for the construction of buildings and other infrastructure developments, salary to self-financing staff, scholarships. PTA: Audit is carried out by external Chartered accountants and reports are published so that stakeholder can scrutinize and thereby make sure accountability. The annual statements of accounts are placed before the Executive committee and the General Body of PTA and Alumni associations for needy students etc.

INTERNAL AUDIT

Internal Audit is done by members of the committee appointed by the Principal. Stock verification of all the assets of each department is verified at the end of every financial year.

Internal and external auditing is done regularly by a practicing Chartered Accountant as well as State

Government auditors for both periodic and annual audits.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC plays a pivotal role in the enhancement and sustainability of quality in the educational services provided by the institution. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is formed in the institution as a quality sustenance measure as per the guidelines of the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore, an autonomous body under the University Grants Commission (UGC). Since quality enhancement is a continuous process, the IQAC is a part of the institution's system and works towards realization of the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance.

As the Teaching Learning system was functional two years back to Covid 19 outbreak, Sree Narayana College, Alathur was the only college which didn't require any new mechanism for online teaching. IQAC has taken great effort to modernize the online teaching learning process in the college and which was highly effective in the COVID period. High speed broadband internet facility installed in the college for an effective online teaching system. Google workspace from educational fundamentals made available in the college.

One of the main achievement of IQAC of this college is that it could provide statewide training in technology supported education for all teachers in the college collaboration with AKPCTA (All Kerala Private College Teachers Association). In the Covid period IQAC could coordinate international as well as national seminars to students as well as teachers for their upliftment.

The IQAC at our college has implemented a feedback of students based on institutional parameters such as infrastructure, learning environment, co curricular activities, curriculum delivery and pedagogy and so

on. Feedback system is very important for the progress of the institution and the submitted feedback is analyzed online and measures are taken for redressal.

Gender equality programmes, Women empowerment programmes, Anti narcotics and drugs abuse awareness programmes, Career Guidance Programmes, Eminent persons commemoration day, Environment day programme, etc for the upliftment of students and faculties. IQAC organised NAAC related one day seminar to equip the faculties with the new framework of the UGC accreditation process.

Apart from this, each and every department organized webinars, awareness programmes, quiz competition, food fest, entrepreneurship related programme, etc for students in association with IQAC. Installed solar power panel in college for energy conservation. IQAC has taken initiative to fulfill infrastructure requirements of each department and college office section.

The institution has conducted diverse activities to propagate to social values that gives importance to individual as a fundamental aspect of society. The activities were organized under the aegis of NCC, NSS, Women cell, Debate club, ED club etc. socially relevant programs inculcating human values, gender equality communal harmony, and a universal code of ethics. The fundamental objective of the institution is to make every student a 'change agent' who is aware of the role to play in their community and to enrich the students with basic humanitarian concerns.

The last five years were tough times for everyone to survive. It was during this period students came forward with relevant activities with full spirit. Mid-day meals program: The distribution of food kits, Cleaning Programmes inside and outside the Campus, Blood Donation Camp, hair donation for Cancer patients, ground water recharging system, distribution of bio-compost, Distribution of Pulse Oximeter, Distribution of flood relief classes and donated books for school students. Teachers are taken different services in the Covid affected area.

Implementation: -

Sensitization of students and employees in the institution to the constitutional obligations, values, rights, duties, gender equality, and responsibilities of the institution are emphasized in order to make them responsible to the society in which they belong to. Implementation: -

Students have taken an oath to keep their surroundings neat and clean and not to harm the environment. Cleaning and campus beautification programs are conducted regularly.

Green audit and Energy audit are done as part of the green initiative.

Baskets are contributed to all classrooms and staff rooms to dump the plastic and non-plastic waste. To ensure the cleanliness and beauty of the campus, the college initiated an MoU with the Agency. Two separate tri colour bins are placed inside the campus to dump plastic and non-plastic wastes. The Haritha karma sena workers collect the plastic wastes once a month and it is further reused and recycled efficiently for making other products. In an attempt to create awareness among students about environment and its significance, all the departments take active participation in conducting programmes towards the same end. World environment day and ozone day are extensively celebrated and competitions are arranged. Fire belts are installed around the campus to protect it from forest fires. The college has installed 4 KW solar panel and thereby encourages nature friendly energy consumption.

In order to keep waste free campus, the college has extensive provision for bio-compost preparation. All the waste materials are well sorted and properly managed. In association with the Department of Microbiology, efforts are taken to check the air, water and soil quality. In an attempt to create a plastic free campus, all the waste plastic materials are collected and recycled. Used bottles are re used as containers for various purposes.

The college has provision for rain shelter which has been constructed with the idea to protect crops from damages caused by heavy rainfall. Programmes to impart information regarding the importance of ground water recharging are regularly conducted by various departments and the college has well executed provisions for the same as well.

The college maintained more than three acres of bio diversity park is and regularly documented and also a vegetable garden which promotes the green life through various measures. The flora and fauna life inside the campus is given prime importance and accordingly campus has more than 18 acres of rain forest land.

The college also creates disabled friendly environment by introducing great measures to provide all facilities for people with disability concerns. Separate pathways, wheel chairs and special toilet and sanitary requirements are provided. Scribes for students with difficulties are provided by the campus.

NCC, NSS and various clubs and committees ensures their own initiatives and participation for the overall development of the students of our college.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

The COVID-19 pandemic created unprecedented challenges for educational institutions worldwide. However, Sree Narayana College in Alathur, Kerala, responded quickly and proactively by implementing an online, ICT-enabled mode of teaching as of March 10th, 2020. This allowed the college to continue its academic activities without any disruption. The college's management, faculty members, and staff worked tirelessly to make this transition possible.

To facilitate the online classes, each class tutor created a Google Classroom for their respective classes, and faculty members shared their online resources through virtual classrooms and WhatsApp groups. The teachers used various online platforms, including YouTube links, to make the classes engaging and interactive. However, the college recognized that some students lacked digital devices or internet facilities, and therefore, the college administration provided them with the necessary assistance, supervised by the Principal and Staff Association.

The college also organised counseling sessions online to help students deal with stress and anxiety.

To ensure effective teaching, the college arranged class tests and doubt-clearing sessions. All departments arranged national and international webinars during the academic year 2020-21, giving students the opportunity to interact with renowned academicians and writers. The central library, NSS, NCC, and other clubs also organized webinars. Additionally, the college arranged career counseling programmes for outgoing students.

Although the college opened physical classes on October 4th, 2021, the tutors continue to maintain their Google Classrooms and other online platforms to provide additional materials and clear doubts. The college is committed to providing a comprehensive and inclusive learning experience to all its students, both offline and online. The college administration and faculty members recognize that online learning is an effective tool for learning and intend to incorporate it into the college's academic activities in the future.

Concluding Remarks :

The Sree Narayana College , Alathur has been a leading institution in the movement to uplift socially and educationally backward sections of society since its establishment in 1970. The college places great importance
